



The Attachment Style Interview for Researchers & Clinicians (ASI-RCP) Royal Holloway, University of London

The Research Attachment Style Interview (ASI-RCP) is an assessment tool, which assesses characteristics of adults and young people in terms of their quality of close relationships, social support and security of attachment style.

Training package & costs

A 3 day training workshop, taking place in central London, is available for researchers and clinicians, which will enable the reliable use of the assessment tool.

The training involves:

- A 3-day training workshop for researchers and clinicians wanting to learn to use the ASI reliably. The current cost of the training is £150 per day, or £450 for full 3 days per trainee.
- Additional arrangements can be made for further evaluation of the ASI in practice, continued consultation and reliability with Professor Bifulco and her team if required.

The ASI is an interview which **assesses characteristics of young people and adults** in terms of their quality of partnerships, or (relationship with parents for young people) social support and attachment style. It is one of the few attachment style interviews which has a transparent method of questioning and scoring to assess both secure and insecure relating styles. The training course will enable researchers to administer and reliably score the ASI.

The ASI research interview has been used extensively in research studies to examine psycho-social risks for mental health problems, including major depression, anxiety and post natal depression. It has also been extensively used cross culturally and is translated into a number of languages including Japanese, French, German and Italian. Its reliability and validity is established among researchers (including several cross cultural studies) and high levels of association are found with depression outcomes and social factors such as poor support, low self-esteem and early adverse childhood experience and tracking such needs over the course of crises that may arise with the placed child.

The training is run by Professor Antonia Bifulco at Royal Holloway, University of London and her team of researchers. Professor Bifulco is an experienced social scientist with 20 years experience researching family life, parenting, neglect/abuse and support in relation to mental health. The other four co-trainers are all researchers with extensive experience of the ASI and with additional experience in evaluating services, assessing children and counselling and play therapist skills.

Training workshop timetable (3 days)

Day 1: An overview of the ASI categories and rating procedures, the interview and rating system. Introduction to scoring quality of marital relationship, support and relating ability.

Day 2: Intensive training in scoring quality of marital relationship, support and relating ability. This will be aided by video and audio-taped interviews and vignettes of adults' support-contexts. Introduction to assessing attachment style.

Day 3: Intensive training in assessing attachment style in terms of secure and insecure styles and those enmeshed, fearful, dismissive and withdrawn. Trainees will acquire reliable scoring of interviews and vignettes.

Location & duration

All the training will take place at our offices **11 Bedford Square**, Royal Holloway, University of London WC1B 3RF (020 7307 8602). 11 Bedford Square is located on the corner of Gower Street and Montague Place and is 5-10 minutes in a taxi from King's Cross Railway station.

All training will take place between 10am and 4pm with lunch 1-2pm. There may be a little reading or rating set as homework tasks.
